

#### Service Reports

BEACON AUTO BODY, Silver Spring, MD (In the alley behind Gifford's Ice Cream--If I gave you alley behind Gifford's ice cream--II I gave you the address, you couldn't find it.) Al Bridges, the owner of this fine little place, has a good thing going and if, God forbid, you need body work, this is the place to go!! I hurt my little Puppchen a few weeks ago and had her towed to Dr. Bridges auto hospital. My insurance co., GEIGO, would only cover \$9 per hour on the labor, so I paid the difference to cover Beacon's \$12 per hour because I knew it was worth it. I was also lucky enough to get one of GEICO's best estimators so all necessary parts were replaced. The job was absolutely perfect and I have no gripes at all, except for the absolutely utterly ridiculous prices charged for BMW parts. There is no excuse for this! A hood for the car (mind was ok, though!) this! A hood for the car (mind was ok, though!) costs about \$350. OK? A hood for an overpriced Eldo Cadillac costs about \$180. And, a hood for a Honda Civic costs about \$60.

Al's manager, Jim, is very consciencious, as are all the employees at Beacon. Incidentally, for your information, an enamel paint job at Beacon costs about \$250 and a lacquer job about \$500. (You have a waiting period for lacquer since it cannot be sprayed on humid days or it will "blush"!) If your original paint job is cracking, the cost will go over \$1K, since the paint must be sanded off completely.) While my car was there, it was painted completely in a GM metallic marcon and the job is great!

BEACON AUTO BODY (Again!). Dave Roach got the rear end of his 2002 severely damaged last year. The damage included both fenders, trunk lid, trunk floor, the chrome, a rear suspension to body sup-port and the passenger seat. The work was done promptly and accurately once the appraiser got promptly and accurately once the appraiser got there (As was in my case.) Dave found Alan "assuring, careful and affable. I would say at <u>least</u> that! Dave said of the work: "...More than to my satisfaction; to my delight!" Fur-ther: "I give Beacon my highest praise!"

VOB, Rockville, Maryland. (Old Georgetown Rd.) I got a number of reports on VOB, particularly from our service reports champion, "Reporting-Robert Critchlow" Bob had a pair of foglights installed at VOB. Lothar actually fabricated a set of elegant mounting brackets and welded them to the front bumper brackets. Ed Alber installed the lights and wired them in. The whole job cost \$48 labor and \$14 parts. Bob thought the whole

job was neatly done. Bob had his 24K miles servicing done at VOB. Ed again worked on the car and did a thorough job. Labor \$53.20 and parts, etc., \$33.07. He also had the front transmission seal replaced at VOB since it wasn't doing a satisfactory job of holding oil. Again, Ed Alber did the work and did a thorough job. The labor was \$112 to which Bob said "Wow!" (The standard cost for labor to R and R a transmission is about \$100 on a 2002.) The parts were \$17.

Bruce Cranford, our member who was unfortunate enough to take his car to Terry Wyban for repair finally got the parts back and got everything to VOB. If you don't remember, his car was emitting blue smoke and missed above 5000 rpm. Apparently, the fault was in the oil pump, resulting in a damaged crank, scored cylinder walls and wiped cam. Terry also burnt up the wiring, says Bruce, when a short occurred while removing the engine. Somewhere along the line, the locks required re-placement. Bruce felt VOB did a good job except it took way too long. (The holdup was the re-grinding of the camshaft.) The engine runs very well but a little hot. Bruce says it doesn't

give the same gas mileage (down 15%) but this can be attributable to the fact that he has a new engine, essentially, and has to run it about 5000 miles. The parts for the engine, etc. ran \$590 and the labor \$539.00. The replacement locks ran \$86 for parts and \$114 for labor.

HEISHMAN, Arlington, VA. (Jeff Davis Hwy.) Walter Light brought his 2800 sedan in with a Heishman was in agreement as to what the problem was and repaired it for \$280 labor and \$110 parts,

After a very careful inspection, Heishman agreed that this, indeed, was the problem, and they fixed it free under warantee. Everything was done to Jim's satisfaction and he rates Heishman "Positive+".

Our ubiquitous Bob Critchlow had his weatherstriping around the sunroof replaced at Heishman for \$39 labor and \$12 parts. Again, everything was done to his satisfaction and he feels Joe Anderson is a pleasure to do business with. (So what else is new?!) Incidentally, I have a black plastic welting which can be used to line the edge around the sunroof. It looks better than the original fuzzy stuff and lasts much longer. You put it on with contact cement. have a roll of the stuff and I'll sell enough to do two sunroofs for \$3.00. Please call me! Mel, 384-5858)

Heishman did a competent job on Lorin Evans' 1974 Bavaria on three different job on Lorin Evans' 1974 Bavaria on three different occasions. Lorin bought his car in North Carolina, but is now local. He had his carburetor fixed at 1K mi., his driver's seat-belt at 3K mi., and his windshield washer at 6K mi. I talked to him about this, incidentally, and he in-formed me that he has been through 3 pairs of nozzles in about 24K mi. He thinks they must be made of paper or something as they disintegrate made of paper or something as they disintegrate shortly after you pump commercially available washer fluid through them. They also seem to clog up regularly, perhaps as Lorin observes, because there is no filter in the system. Lorin says of Heishman: "They fixed everything and have given first class service."

Geoffrey Randall bought his 72 Bavaria used from Heishman. They did a good job of the regular maintenance of the car, including servicing the air conditioner. He felt they were very satisfactory in their work and were thorough except for failing to reconnect the hoses to the air cleaner and leaving off two valve caps. (They sent him new ones by mail.)

AUTODYNAMICS, Rockville, MD (977-2220). Howard Jenerick took his 72 2002 to Autodynamics on Somerville Dr. in Rockville, He had an oil drip which was attributable to a leak from the lower front timing cover. The job took 10 hours of labor at \$15 per hour plus \$18.50 for parts. Howard does not "run" the car and is a little upset about something like that happening, particularly when the design of the cover is such as to require such extensive labor to fix. Rick himself was a little chagrinned at the extensive work that was required for what could have been a simpler job had the proper thought gone into the original design. Howard is very satisfied with Autodynamics and is very pleased with Rick's shop. The car was delivered when promised and Rick threw in a new thermostat and cleaned the engine while he was at it. This is the first report on Autodynamics.

SCHWING MOTORS, Baltimore, MD (301) 243-1300. We also have a first report on Schwing Motors. The engine on his 73 Bavaria (30,000 mi.) was overheating. Schwing diagnosed the problem as requiring the following : Recoring the radiator, a lower thermostat, and "unlocking" the fan. The job cost \$77 in labor and \$20 in parts and was done satisfactorily. There are no overheating problems and the temp. gauge stays at less than half way on the indicator. His overall impressions of Schwing are "Good." (I don't know how one gets a "locked" fan. Can someone out there tell me?)

As an observation, there are several steps which will preclude overheating in your car. First, install an overflow tank on the radiator if it doesn't have one already. The radiator can if it doesn't have one already. The radiator can now be kept full and it's now able to essentially eliminate the possibility of any air or foam "locks" anywhere in the cooling system. Install a Prestone flush kit. It costs a few bucks and allows you to hook the garden hose directly into the cooling system. Its position allows you to backflush the radiator while you clean out the entire system. The ethylene glycol in the anti-freeze does not wear out, only the additives do. Thus, there is no need to replace the antifreeze every year. What one does do is to add a can of a good grade of radiator additive and water pump lubricant (such as Dow or Prestone) after the first year. The next year, run the car for a day or so with a <u>powdered</u> type radiator flush, flush the system out thoroughly through the flush kit, add the flush neutralizer and run the car around for another day or so. Then, flush the entire system again, thoroughly, and <u>then</u> add fresh antifreeze. My cooling system is <u>dead clean</u> and stays that way! An antenna is the means whereby the power generated by your CB transceiver is changed to radiation.

There are two different types of antenna - omnidirectional and beam. Mobile antennas are generally of the omnidirectional type which means that radiation is emitted from all sides.

that radiation is emitted from all sides. A basic antenna is a simple pole whose length is equal to one wave or about 36 feet or 432 in. Since a full wave antenna is not too practical on any vehicle, manufacturers "load" the antenna by using a coil to obtain a theoretical quarter wave of about 108 inches. The long "whip" antennas seen fastened to bumpers are 102 inches long and when added to the mount measure a total of 108 inches or a quarter wave. Still more manufacturers use more loading to attain the theoretical wave length to such an extent that they can operate with a total length of 30 inches or more.

Since the radiating portion of the antenna is vertical, the radiation is also vertical in nature. For an antenna to work properly, there is a "ground plane" introduced at the bottom of the antenna to give the radiation a field from which to bounce off. This is necessary because you are working with waves of the AM variety which are "line-of-sight" in nature with some small deviation allowing for the bend at the horizon. Without a ground plane, the waves below the horizontal plane would be wasted and you would not get full output.

As mentioned, there is some variation when the waves reach the horizon and they can bend to a small degree. Those waves that do not bend go off into space until they strike the ionosphere where

they bounce back towards the earth. This is why when atmospheric conditions are exactly right. contact may be made with stations quite distant from yours. The only problem with contacts of this nature is that they are illegal and can result in fine and confiscation of the equipment.

The first rule for an antenna is that the higher it can be located the better it will operate. On a vehicle, the best location for an antenna is in the center of the roof provided the roof is metal. Any other location is a compromise and your transmission will suffer for it. In determining the location of your antenna you must always keep in mind that the material into which it is fastened must be grounded. It is surprising the number of automotive components which are separated from the body by rubber, nylon or plastic.

The next column will deal with the way you can determine how an antenna will probably work when you put it on your car.

Questions concerning CB's are invited, but do not include technical inquiries. The technical aspects of CB radios are the purvue of the FCC licensed technician.

### Meeting Minutes

BMWCCA MONTHLY MEETING September 21, 1976

Estelle Torpy called the meeting to order at 8:35 p.m.

New Members introduced themselves.

The minutes of the August meeting were approved as printed in der bayerische.


