As the donations continued to grow, we saw a need to include some recognition through the presentation of a very large check which represented the total amount donated. The date was December 14th, 2024 and the amount was \$6.759. Let that sink in for a moment...and know that the Salvation Army did not charge an "overhead/admin" fee for this, so every dollar went directly to support and feed people in dire need. The Salvation Army's cost to provide a hot meal in a disaster area is \$1.67, so the donations the NCC raised "fed" about 4,047 people! Ms. Michelle Wolfe, my contact at the Salvation Army DC Headquarters office, was our questof-honor. She is seen in the photo receiving the check. The remarks she then made stunned many of us, since we have never been in a massive disaster zone before. She described that in addition to feeding the victims, they also feed the first-responders, as there are no grocery stores or restaurants left in the areas that were wiped out. The money donated is also used to provide essential supplies for babies

and children such as diapers and baby food. We were all visibly moved by the enormity of the situation, but our hearts were warmed by the knowledge that the NCC made a big contribution to the recovery efforts. This memory will be with us for the rest of our lives. If you were a donor, know that you made a difference and fed the hungry.

The story would end there, except that this was December 14th, and the website for donations remained active until Dec 31st. On December 31st, I was driving down to Florida in my X3 when a call came in - Ms. Wolfe said she had some news for me, and that I might want to pull over and stop. What she then told me made my day, and continues to inspire me. The final donation total was \$12,287!!! Unbelievable!! Outstanding!! If all of these funds all went to meals, then the NCC provided about 7,357 meals to people impacted by this disaster. Our friends, our citizens, perhaps even some cousins - were fed, given shelter, and provided baby supplies, etc. THANK YOU, NCC members who donated, and also for the outreach to organizations and individuals outside the club that donated. Together, we made a big difference, and with that our 2024 NCC season ended on a high-note!

wenty-five years ago, BMW opened a Technology Office in Palo Alto California. The idea was simple — use this office as a rotational assignment for "high potential" BMW engineers, immersing them in the world's center of innovation to investigate, assess, and transition leading edge technologies to be used in the development of future BMWs.

Establishing this office was not without internal controversy. There were some within "the Cylinders" who thought this would be nothing more than a "surfing" assignment — the assigned engineers would surf the Pacific Ocean in the morning, then surf the web in the afternoon.

While one of the engineers with whom we worked was a surfer, these young Ph.D. engineers brought back a treasure trove of technologies that have been integrated into today's BMW products, keeping them on the bleeding edge. Features that we take for granted, such as hybridelectric powertrains, fuel-cells, backbone architecture, digital electric drivetrains. head-up displays, over-the-air software upgrades, and autonomous-driving technologies - all have Silicon Valley roots.

One of the "side effects" was that these engineers were immersed in the American car culture - specifically the unique California car culture. Some may have attended events hosted by both the Golden Gate Chapter and the Greater Los Angeles Chapter of the BMW CCA. No doubt, they also enjoyed the annual Monterey "car week", the historic car race at Laguna Seca, and the Pebble Beach concours.

And it would not surprise us to learn that the hazing ritual for the newly assigned engineers was for the "veterans" to take them to a fast-food restaurant drive-through – and have them eat their meal in the car.

After all these years, there is

no doubt that some of the engineers who spent time in California are now in BMW senior leadership positions. In fact, some may follow the BMW CCA activities. So, when Dr. Klaus Frohlich announced the launch of the G29 Z4 at the 2018 Los Angeles Auto Show, the

"American German" BMW leaders were thinking, "We'll need a manual-transmission version".

To the German OEMs, the American love for manual transmissions makes as much sense as cupholders. As many a German OEM engineer has asked, "Why do you guys like it so much when you can't even drive it properly"?


And that is a good question. When I was involved with NASCAR, I often wondered why those "good old boys" wanted manual shifters when a vast majority of their races were held on high-speed oval tracks. And watching just one NASCAR road race makes it immediately obvious that those same "good old boys" have not a clue as to how to properly shift.

But we all know that this is a classic left-brain, right-brain argument. We're Americans. When we're emotionally attached to something, logic goes out the window.

The "American German" BMW leadership understands this. But a positive business case had to be developed, and then approved.

It took four years, but that mission was accomplished. These true "American German" believers managed to approve a business case for a little over 800 cars to be assembled at the Graz, Austria

plant. And the result is the wonderful Z4 M40 "hand switch" model. For one wonderful week in California, we rediscovered the romance of driving a manual transmission "Ultimate Driving" roadster.

This was not without a price — and that price being a \$3,500 option available only in the top-of-the-line Z4 M40i. Our test vehicle retailed for \$77,740. Were we to order one, we would skip the "Frozen" paint job (we still don't understand the popularity of this paint color) which would result in a \$2,950 saving. And while that price does sound a little steep, it's much less than the "equivalent" Porsche. There is no Mercedes competitor - the VERY expensive SL roadster does not offer manual transmission!

By the way, the Z4 M40i Handschalter is REAR-WHEEL DRIVE. If a manual-transmission, rear-wheel-drive BMW roadster with a 382-horsepower, 369-foot pound of torque TwinPower turbocharged in-inline six-cylinder engine doesn't stir your BMW

enthusiast soul, then maybe you should stick to watching flowers grow.

When you approach the M4 Handschalter, you know that you're about to have a very special driving



experience. The staggered tires (255/35R19 in the front, 285/30R20 in the rear) enhance the aggressive exterior design. Whether the top is up or down, the red brake calipers and the aggressive rear wheel bulges connote a serious ultimate driving machine.

This Z4 has perhaps the most taut BMW exterior design since the E46-Series. It gives the impression that the BMW engineers started with the chassis, installed an aggressive front and rear suspension that would yield outstanding handling, placed the famous B58 engine as low as possible,

designed in a comfortable and cozy interior, and added an appropriate sized trunk before stretching on an exterior skin. This skin reveals both the athleticism and the beauty of this vehicle. To give it a human analogy – think of a combination of Steffi Graf and Heidi Klum – an outstanding combination of timeless athleticism and timeless beauty.

Opening the hood reinforces the "taut" vibe. The B58 engine appears to have been "shoehorned" into the vehicle. But oddly enough, it looks "right".

And while every BMW interior design makes one want to hop in and drive, when one sees the three pedals, the true enthusiast can't help but smile.

The execution and refinement of the Z4's interior design is clearly best in class. It is both cozy and comfortable. The fit and finish, as well as the quality of the interior materials are outstanding.

Thankfully, most of the controls and operations are similar to those on my 2020 M240i convertible, so we weren't fumbling through buttons and dials to configure the Z4 instrument panel and infotainment screen to our liking.

The standard logical BMW seat, steering wheel, and mirror controls allowed us to quickly find "the" comfortable driving position. And with a top that goes down in less than 10 seconds (as opposed to the seemingly forever 22 seconds on the M240i convertible) we were off.

As a reminder that the German auto engineers believe we Americans don't know how to properly drive manual-transmission cars, the instrument panel will not only show when to shift, but to which gear. And while initially a bit annoying, we did learn that these "suggestions" provide a more

pleasant driving experience.

There is only one complaint – and ironically, it's with the placement of the cupholders. Located in the center console, the open cover interfered with operation of the manual shifter. The placement was anything but convenient. But perhaps that was a not-so-subtle hint from the BMW

designers that this car was made for driving, and not for stowing cups.

And drive we did.

Stepping on BOTH the brake and the clutch pedals. then pressing the center console mounted start button results in a satisfying engine ignition "snort". Keeping the clutch pedal depressed, we go through the ritual of shifting through the gears. Returning to first gear, we left the clutch pedal while slightly depressing the accelerator pedal.

> We engaged. And we were off.

This car is simply a blast to drive. Usually when we drive a manual transmission car, we're reminded of everything we love and hate about manual transmissions. so with the Z4 - driving this car is pure joy. The driver's cockpit seems to be designed ideally for manual

shifting – with the seat, steering wheel, pedals, and shifter all in ergonomically ideal positions. The 2025 Z4 M40i Handschalter brings back the romance of driving a manual transmission convertible. Frankly, it would surprise us if all these Z4's were not already pre-sold!

On this Northern California to Southern California and back trek, we tried to imagine the first time the newly assigned BMW engineers from Germany experienced the wonderful California roads and the interesting California driving conditions. Having driven throughout Germany, we're certain that traveling on the Golden State Freeway and on State Highway 99 throughout Central California and seeing all the working farmland and ranches had to be an eye-opening experience.

Driving through the Napa, Sonoma, Paso Robles, Santa Barbara, San Luis Obispo, and Temecula wine countries, may have given the Germans the impression that California fuels the global wine economy.

Driving to the James Dean memorial on Highway 46 as well as visiting the James Dean memorial at the Griffith Park observatory may have inspired them to watch classic James Dean movies. Learning that James Dean died while driving a Porsche to Laguna Seca to participate in a race may have had the feel of his spirit.

The part of the Golden State Freeway that connects Orange County to San Diego through Camp Pendleton may have given them the impression that this section of freeway had no posted speed limit.

Of course, driving the California coast on U.S Highway 101 and California Highway 1 may have made them appreciate why some at BMW may think that all they do is surf!

And driving along the Northern and Southern California freeways

during rush hour may have had them wondering HOW such horrendous traffic congestion can occur, especially on freeways that have ten lanes on either side.

After a while, they may have begun to understand and appreciate the unique California car culture. With with freedom.

Attending the frequent local BMW Car Club of America chapter "cars and

its mild coastal weather conditions, every California day is a "top down" convertible day. Long drives on the backroads to Laguna Seca, Sears Point, Willow Springs, and Buttonwillow and attending races there as well as going to the Winter Nationals NHRA meet at the Pomona Fairgrounds may have made them understand why Americans equate horsepower and mobility

coffees" and car meets, the frequent classic car "cruise ins", the Pomona classic car swap meets, the weekly Huntington Beach "Donut Derelicts" car meet and visiting the Petersen Automotive Museum may have made them understand WHY the American car enthusiast want their manual transmissions.

And at the end of their assignment, these German engineers who came to work in America returned to Germany as American Germans.

The 2025 BMW Z4 M40i Handschalter is the American German roadster that's made for the BMW Car Club of America enthusiast. It's an outstanding Ultimate Driving Machine that's also an outstanding daily driver. When purchasing, one should seriously consider the extended maintenance package. You'll be surprised how this car makes you want to drive for the sake of driving, with no destination in mind.

Incidentally, twenty-two years ago, the first engineer we met at the BMW Technology Office drove an E85 manual transmission Z4!

If the Z4 M40i Handschalter is as successful as we anticipate, it will be interesting to see how the "American Germans" influence future BMW and MINI product designs.

One more thing, while the "Frozen Green Metallic" exterior color attracts a younger clientele, a majority of them asked the same question:

"What's that third pedal for?"

he National Capital Chapter Driving Tours program, composed of co-chairs Chris Torin, Brian Hunt, and Devin Moreno, along with a large and capable team of committee members, outdid themselves planning this year's annual Thanksgiving Pie Run. On a cool and blustery mid-November day, over 50 cars showed up at 8



So, what did we learn? First and foremost, our range anxiety decreased significantly. The navigation system provided a precise "end state of charge" indicator for each destination. And while it's no surprise that the more powerful the charger, the faster the recharge time, it also costs more to use those

chargers. And pricing is based on local demand – which is why charging at night is so popular.

The charging process is both straightforward and awkward. Straightforward because it's "plug and charge". Awkward because the cable and charger plug are quite heavy, and EV charging ports are located

relatively high with the plug connectors angled.

The bottom line is that long road trips with an EV are possible. But not without anxiety, hazards, and added time.

Unlike on other road trips, careful planning is a "must" with an EV. While there are a number of fast charging apps, it is very

nice to use the internet to check on the condition of public fast charger stations — the EV owner community is quite vocal about the conditions and locations. Most importantly, you will need to budget in some extra time. You'll get there, but it will take longer than you're accustomed to.

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

I used to think that the DMV had a great car culture, and it absolutely does; but California is a different animal. Katie's Cars & Coffee or Hunt Valley Horsepower are great places around here to see some cool cars.

You'll get a ton of Ferraris, Lambos, McLarens, and of course, some great BMWs, but Monterey Car Week is extravagant beyond belief. There may be \$1 billion dollars worth of cars in the DMV, but it's tenfold for the annual August gathering on the Bay.

Unfortunately, I couldn't attend the entire event, so I focused on the end of the last weekend. Monterey isn't especially easy to get to, and it's even more difficult to find a place to stay. In fact, as soon as I knew I was headed West, I booked an Airbnb and this was five months in advance. I would have booked it sooner but had to convince some friends to go too. No way was I going to experience this myself, so luckily recruiting Afshawn Towfighi and Greg Mondeau didn't require much arm twisting. We all complained about how expensive it would be, and we still needed to rent a car, get a flight, and eat; but I can be pretty convincing.

As we got closer to the event, we had to figure out our schedule. There were several events I wanted to make sure to attend, such as Legends of the Autobahn and the Rolex Motorsport Reunion at Laguna Seca. Both

required tickets so getting those booked was easy, and there were also a bunch of great free events to fill out our day.

Due to the long flight out, we couldn't make the CCA driving tour that the Golden Gate chapter put together, so we ended up at The Little Car Show in

Pacific Grove. An annual, free to spectators' event, the city shuts down several blocks along the downtown area, and cars are lined up anywhere they can find a spot. There were so many cool vintage cars to see of all makes and models; but, of course, we focused on a few BMWs that showed up. Cross country travel can tire you out, and we knew that the next day, Thursday, was going to be a big day.

After a great breakfast with friends, we made our way to the Lodge at Pebble Beach. I knew this was the 50th anniversary of the M5, but I didn't really know exactly what to expect. I heard all the rumors and hints from many but quickly found out this was the BMW North America reveal of the new G90 M5 Sedan and the G99 M5 Touring! Overlooking the famed 18th hole at Pebble Beach, guest emcee Derek Bell, introduced all seven M5 chassis ever produced: E28, E34, E60, F10, F90, and the new G90. It was a very special display to see the ocean backdrop at Pebble Beach with each immaculate sedan shining brightly on a mostly overcast morning. As we watched BMW M CEO Frank Van Meel drive the G90 M5 and Connor De Phillippi pilot the G99 M5 Touring onto the stage, you could feel the crowd getting excited. Derek Bell and several celebrities wanted to grab the keys to take the cars for a spin, as the worldwide press started to converge on both cars for video and pictures.

We were also in a time crunch. Legends of the Autobahn started early, and we were hoping to get there by lunchtime. Then we learned that all seven generations of the M5 would be displayed at the show. Upon arrival, we noticed heads turning as this convoy of

cars made its way into the middle of the show field. For any oundel fan, Legends is a must see; there are several hundred pristine BMWs from Isettas to E30 M3 Sport Evos to cool builds like E46 M3 wagons. As the sun burned off the morning fog, it was amazing to see all the CCA member cars. To hear the stories, time, and effort they put into their cars, the passion truly comes through. Whether it's their daily driver or one of a collection, it was all smiles, all day. This continued throughout the night, during our M Chapter dinner at the Chart House at Cannery Row overlooking the seals, sea lions, and Monterey Bay. After an extremely busy day, all I wanted to do was crash as we finally headed back to our Airbnb.

A week before I left for Monterey, I received an invitation to a special, private event at the BMW Villa. It was a free event hosted by BMW NA, which had rented someone's \$10-million-dollar home on Poppy Hills golf course, one of several golf courses located in the Pebble Beach area. This 6,500square-foot house was unbelievable and equipped with a huge garage, where they stored the new M5 sedan, M5 Touring, and several other display cars. This event was to entice people to buy new cars, as they showcased all BMWs that cost six figures and up: M8, X5M, X7, XM, Alpina B8 and XB7. We were able to take a few of them for a spirited drive around the peninsula; 600+ horsepower never felt so good! 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
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
